MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR OF OUR PARISH FATHER LUBOMIR

(An interview at the end of the icon exhibition)

"Dear Beloved Parishioners and Friends of Our Parish,

Today is a very joyous and special day for all of us because we have the rare opportunity to approach and venerate numerous ancient Russian icons from 17th-19th centuries. These icons are part of a private collection of br. George N, who has been collecting icons for over 35 years. Recently, he has come with an idea to have some of his icons displayed in our St. Vladimir's Church.

So today, for the first time in the history of our parish such a great event takes place. We are blessed by this remarkable opportunity to venerate very special icons. Each of these icons has a great spiritual value for the believers. In addition, we have not just one but more then fifty marvelous ancient icons on display. Moreover, we also have a chance to honor Tsarskoe Evangelie (Holy Gospel) which has been placed in the center of the amyon right in front of the Royal Doors for the duration of the exhibition. This way, all of us have the same opportunity to acknowledge some of ancient traditions which historically have always been an important part of the Russian Orthodox Church. Today, more than ever we got so much closer to the remarkable spiritual inheritance of the Orthodoxy. In fact, Icons have a mystical power to reveal and reflect the spirit and capture the moment of time in which they were created. We all know that the 17th, 18th and 19th centuries were very productive both for the Orthodox Church and for the entire Russian society in general. At that time, such great servants of God lived in Russia as did: St. Seraphim of Sarov, Holy blessed Xenia of Petersburg, and the elders of Optina just to name a few. They all left a profound mark in the history of the Russian Orthodox Church. In addition, the fervent prayers of these saints spiritually nourished many generations. Consequently, these icons are witnesses of their legacy. By the veneration of the icons, we are able to go back to that time and reunite with some of these renowned fathers and servants of God.

In spite the fact, that this is the first time when we hold such an event in our Church, the exhibition seemed to be very successful. Visitors had flocked to the exhibit from the very beginning. Now, it is almost the end of the exhibit but new people are still coming to see these remarkable Icons. I have to admit the fact that all visitors have behaved extraordinary toward the Church's etiquette. They all have been kind, peaceful, and pious. It seems that people clearly

understand the meaning of this very special event. Although, some of them are non-Orthodox, all visitors behave respectfully while observing the Church rules of piety. Many of the visitors are praying, and weeping at the same time. In addition, many are asking questions, trying to learn more for themselves. This is such an opportunity to elevate oneself spiritually and at the same time to gain knowledge for his/hers benefit.

In our day and age, icons like these can be found only in museums. Tell me, if you can, where in America can you find such icons in this vast number together? Only in the private collections or as I already mentioned, in the museums. Therefore, we are so happy to have such an unlimited access and an intimate privilege to venerate fifty ancient Icons. Very seldom, something like this can happen. Most of all, we are very grateful to God for His blessings. Today, He gave us strength and a beautiful weather to see us through. As you remember in the beginning of this week there was a snowfall, which was a rare occasion in Houston. Consequently, I worried about the weather and it's affect on the exhibition. In addition, I worried about the people and their journey to the Church but look what happened today – we have a very nice weather and a joyful mind-set because everything went as it should. The Divine Liturgy was served in front of these beautiful icons and, because the icons took up all the space in the Church, we felt as if we were transmitted into another world. As the Church filled with believers in the presence of so many icons, the Heaven and earth connected together in one festal moment.

INSPIRED BY THE ICON EXHIBIT

(Attempt for an essay) 21st of December, 2008

"An impressive collection of icons, Holy Images that are an inseparable part of the Orthodox Christian Tradition, were on display at our St. Vladimir Russian Orthodox Church last Sunday. These unique Images are a private collection of George N. As he himself comments, these icons are characterized by their faithfulness to the ancient Byzantine traditions in both technique and composition, which beautifully merges with the Russian purity of heart. They are painted according to the traditional techniques; egg tempera on wood panel with gold/silver-leaf gilding and ornamentations, the same techniques that were used more than a thousand years ago.

Generally icons were not created for aesthetic enjoyment only but mainly for public veneration and personal devotion. Their subjects are often portraits of Christ, His Holy Mother or Saints, but they may be narratives or even depictions of hymns. Orthodox Byzantine icons of Jesus Christ are icons related to the life of Christ, His work of redemption and salvation of mankind. The icons of the Mother of God are impression of what Orthodox services often said – "She is "Our All-holy, Immaculate, Most Blessed and Glorified Lady, the Theotokos and Ever-Virgin Mary".

Iconography arrived in Russia from Byzantium shortly after Russia was baptized in the 10th century. Even though the icon remained under the influence of the Byzantine ascetic tradition for many years, it absorbed the images, colors, and traditions of Russia as well.

For almost 2000 years the Christian icon has always been the object of prayer and contemplation for believers.

"I have so much respect for their power – told me one of our parishioners, who would like to remain anonymous. The forces contained in an icon are incredible. Each has its own legendary reference in the Bible. The legend continues to live in the icon."

When I saw these gorgeous icons I was impressed by the intense egg tempera color, yet they were so soft and soothing to the heart! "Icons are alive - I rediscovered for myself. When I look at an icon, spiritual vibrations of yesterday, today, and tomorrow - a universal vibration continually move me. The icon is a creation of spiritual communion with God manifested in the form of a painting."

The old icons were usually painted by monks. The monks who painted the icons were less concerned with the art of the painting than with total surrender to the service and honor of God. Thus, the images were created during mystical experiences of a meditative nature. The icons are objects of meditation – a religious meditation. Perhaps nowadays people would like to have them for this reason.

For the most part, the icons in this exhibition were of the type once displayed in the "beautiful corner" within every Christian Russian home. Only God knows what joys and sorrows were emptied out in front of these sacred images. An infant's baptism, a daughter's wedding, a son's return home from war, a child's death. These were not merely pictures used to decorate the wall, but were, in the words of the Russian peasant "windows into heaven." They were comforters in times of sorrow and an ever-present source of joy in an often dismal world of

hardships. The Russian peasants believed that there was something very sacred about icons that exhibited some age. They thought that because they had been witness to so much prayer, perhaps somehow the icon retained some of the holiness poured through it over the many years. Like the peasant, I too am drawn to the icons of old. For me they symbolize a mystical beauty of faith, love and well-being. When I look at the icons I cannot help but think of the iconographer, all who have stood in prayer there before me, and of course their message. I hope that you too found the same joy I have found on my "journey" to better experience these "windows into heaven", embraced by semi-transparent fine silk, dazzling "curtains".

The Tsarskoe Evangelie was placed in the center of the church, in it gorgeous, unforgettable glory. Father Lubomir read from it, we listened, exactly the same way as it was done throughout the many years ago, thousands and thousands of righteous people did. We had a chance to commune and share the divine spirit venerated by many generations of believers.

The icon is God's silent, boundless mercy. The icon is God's poem and song without words. The icon is God's touch, a kiss, and then the empty place that calls forever after to us – the icon is the echo of God's incarnation once and for all time upon the earth. The icon is a rest stop on the way home, a small sanctuary, a protection, a moveable feast that makes us tremble. Blessed be the Name of the Holy One. Blessed be all that God has made. Glory in it. Amen."

THE MYSTERY OF CONFESSION

Confession is the Mystery in which the believer admits his sins before God in the presence of a priest and receives through the priest forgiveness of sins as if from the Lord Jesus Christ Himself.

Jesus Christ gave to the Apostles, and through them to all priests, the power to forgive sins. "Receive the Holy Spirit: whosoever sins you forgive, they are forgiven them; and whosoever sins you retain, they are retained" (John 20:22-23).

Even John the Baptist, preparing people to receive the Savior, preached the baptism of repentance for the remission of sins... "And all were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins" (Mark 1:4-5).

Having received this power from the Lord, the Apostles performed the Mystery of Confession: "And many that believed came, and confessed, and disclosed their sinful deeds" (Acts 19:18).

Forgiveness of sins (absolution) by means of confession requires peace with all one's neighbors, sincere contrition for sins committed, confession, firm determination to correct one's life, faith in the Lord Jesus Christ and hope in His mercy.

Confession makes the soul bright, clean, and light. It allows us to lay down at the Cross of Christ those sins which burden our relationship with Him and each other. FROM THE CHURCH FATHERS – "FASTING AS MEDICINE"

Fasting is a medicine. But medicine, as beneficial as it is, becomes useless because of the inexperience of the user. He has to know the appropriate time that the medicine should be taken and the right amount of medicine and the condition of the body which is to take it, the weather conditions and the season of the year and the appropriate diet of the sick and many other things. If any of these things are overlooked the medicine will do more harm than good. So, if one who is going to heal the body needs so much accuracy, when we care for the soul and are concerned about healing it from bad thoughts, it is necessary to examine and observe everything with every possible detail.

Fasting is the change of every part of our life. Because the sacrifice of the fast is not the abstinence but the distancing from sins. Therefore, whoever limits the fast to deprivation of food, he is the one who, in reality, abhors and ridicules the fast. Are you fasting? Show me your fast with your works. Which works? If you see someone who is poor, show him mercy. If you see an enemy, reconcile with him. If you see a friend who is becoming successful, do not be jealous of him! If you see a beautiful woman on the street, pass her by.

In other words, not only should the mouth fast, but the eyes and the legs and the arms and all the other parts of the body should fast as well. Let the hands fast, remaining clean from stealing and greediness. Let the legs fast, avoiding roads which lead to sinful sights. Let the eyes fast by not fixing themselves on beautiful faces and by not observing the beauty of others. You are not eating meat, are you? You should not eat debauchery with your eyes as well. Let you hearing also fast. The fast of hearing is not to accept bad talk against others and sly defamations. Let the mouth fast from disgraceful and abusive words. Because, what gain is there when, on the one hand we avoid eating chicken and fish and, on the other, we chew up and consume our brothers? He who condemns and blasphemes is as if he has eaten brotherly meat, as if he has bitten into the flesh of his fellow man. It is because of this that Paul frightened us, saying: "If you chew up and consume one another be careful that you do not annihilate yourselves."





Many hundreds of years ago a very holy old man lived in a desert. One day people came to him and said, "Father, teach us, how can we come closer to God while we live in the world?"

The old man drew a circle in the sand at his feet. "This circle is the world," he said "and here in the center of it is God. Each one of us lives in the world," and he made dots around the edge of the circle. "As we try to come closer to God, we draw closer to each other and this is the only way in which we can come closer to God. Remember it."
